The opportunity of training our Youth in Good Citizenship is a real challenge. The National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, met this challenge by selecting 8830 Good Citizens in the U. S. the past year. In Wisconsin 404 girls were honored. 437 Public High Schools were contacted. Miss Ruth Ann Siemers of Mel High School received the \$100 Bond which the National Society awards to the outstanding Good Citizen in each state. Miss Carolyn Ewald of Appleton was presented the second prize of \$25 and the third place winner in the State, Miss Antoinette Dewyer of Eagle River High School won \$15.

The National Association of Secondary School Principals, a Department of the National Education Association, has placed this contest on the Approved List of National contests and activities for 1958-59.

Only girls of the senior class of a Public High School are eligible for this recognition. They must possess these four qualities:

1. Dependability-Truthfulness, loyalty, punctuality.
2. Service----Cooperation, courtesy, civic activities.
3. Leadership-personality, self control, ability to assume responsibility.
4. Patriotism----Unselfish interest in family, school, community, and Nation.

The Senior Class of Bonduel has chosen Bonnie Tuma, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Glenn Tuma of R. 1 Shawano, to receive the DAR Award. This award is given annually at this time by the Daughters of American Revolution. The most curious fact about St. Valentine's day is that its patron had actually nothing to do with the customs connected with the fourteenth of February. BONDUEL'S MR. BASKETBALL

"Short in stature but long in talent" is a good description of Steve Nault, the Bonduel Bears' leading scorer. The lithe, 5' 8" junior guard had scored 345 points in 15 games for a 23 point average. Steve also leads all Central Wisconsin Conference scorers with 240 points in 10 games for a cool 24 point average. His high point night was 35, against Amherst.

Nault's biggest scoring weapon is the jump shot, with which he is deadly from any spot on the floor. This is proven by his fine 44.8% shooting average. Of course many of Steve's points come off of the Bears' fast break style offense. Regardless of how he gets them they are well earned, for each Bonduel opponent sets their defense to "stop Nault". They never really have achieved this because the Bears are not a one man team, and the defense must be ready to stop the likes of Vender Velden, Hasing, Capelle, Stutzman, Aderhold, or Grunewald. This of course takes the pressure off of Nault, and provided a potent offensive punch. The only way to stop Steve Nault is to foul him and then you really don't, because his 80.8% free throw shooting average shows he scores well there also.

Point production isn't Steve's only asset to the team. He is a fine passer, ball handler, and defensive man. He leads the teams with 58 assists, that is; passes which lead directly to baskets.

For anyone who wonders, these special talents of Steve Nault weren't developed overnight, but through long hours of determined practice.

When asked about Steve, Coach Bob Hanson said, "He is certainly one of the best I have ever seen. But remember, fine men start in this game, and a strong bench helps. We have players other than Steve who aren't 'slouches'. Steve and I would look rather silly playing and coaching a game all alone."

BONDUEL OVER RIVAL SEYMOUR

The Bears emerged victorious over the Seymour Indians after a hard-fought 62-57 battle. Although they caught up to the Indians several times Bonduel was still on the short end of a 51-49 score at the end of the third period. But the last period showed the Bears lead by guard Bruce Stutzman gaining the victory on a slim 3 point margin. Stutzman sank 8 buckets and 51 free throws for a total of 21 points. Center Dussling and guard Steve Nault had 16 points and 15 points respectively. This leaves Bonduel with an 8-3 season record, and salves the wounds of an earlier 65-63 loss at Seymour.

Seymour Junior varsity again blanked the Bonduel Jayvees 38-35.

BONDUEL VICTORIOUS OVER WEGA

Sparked by the leading scorer in the CWC, Steve Nault, the Bears rolled over Weyauwega with a 12 point margin Friday night. Bonduel had pulled ahead with an early lead by the end of the first period 14-6. Wega rallied and both teams scored 13 and 19 points respectively in the second and third quarters. Bonduel had remained ahead of the Indians since the first period due to the efforts of guard Steve Nault and center Butch Dussling. Nault came through with 12 buckets and two free throws for a total of 26 points while Dussling made 7 field goals and two free throws for his highest number of points so far this season, 16. The Bears added 4 more points to their 8 point lead to defeat the Indian 65-53.

The Bonduel Jayvees gained a 35-20 victory in the preliminaries.
