Sports Review For Wrestling

Bonduel High's Wrestling squad of 1960-61 ended its season with a 4-7-1 record. This is the finest record any Bonduel wrestling team has ever had in its short life at Bonduel High School.

Some of the highlights of the season included a win over Oconto, the third ranked team in the powerful Bayland Conference, and the Bears also fought to a very unusual 22-22 draw with the highly favored Sturgeon Bay Clippers.

To finish off this very exciting season, Bonduel was awarded one of the 16 W.I.A. A. Regional Wrestling Tournaments. Besides the host team, Bonduel, there were eight other schools participating. They included: Antigo, Coleman, Green Bay East, Green Bay West, Lena, Rhinelander, Oconto, and Oconto Falls.

The Bears really came through in fine glory finishing second behind the 1960 State Champions, Coleman. The boys to whom much of the credit is awarded for this fine showing are Tom Carroll, winner of the 145 lb. class, and also second place winners, Jim Sobiescyck (103); Dave Brokiewicz (120); Tom Westphal (155); and Roy Berkhahn (165). Norbert Nischke gained a third place and Gary Westphal received a fourth place. Of these boys, those who finished either first or second will continue their wrestling at the sectional at Coleman on the 18th of February. On the following Saturday, the State Tournaments will be held at the field house in Madison.

This year the team has chosen as captain and most valuable wrestler Dave Brokiewicz and Gary Westphal respectively. Dave sported a fine 8-4 record this year and Gary's record was 6-5. Others with fine records were Tom Carroll, 10-3; Jim Sobieczyk, 6-2; Roy Berkhahn 6-4; and Norbert Nischke, 7-4.

Coach Tom Flanagan has his hopes set high for the tournament at Coleman and also for his wrestling squad for next year. "We should do very well next year," he says, "As we have many fine boys coming up from the freshmen and sophomore ranks to fill the spots of our graduating seniors." Coach Flanagan also would like to have some student support at Coleman Saturday, and he has arranged to take a bus up there.

As a final note I would like to say on the behalf of the squad. "Thanks for the fine support you've given us in wrestling and lets hope you will continue to come to the matches."
