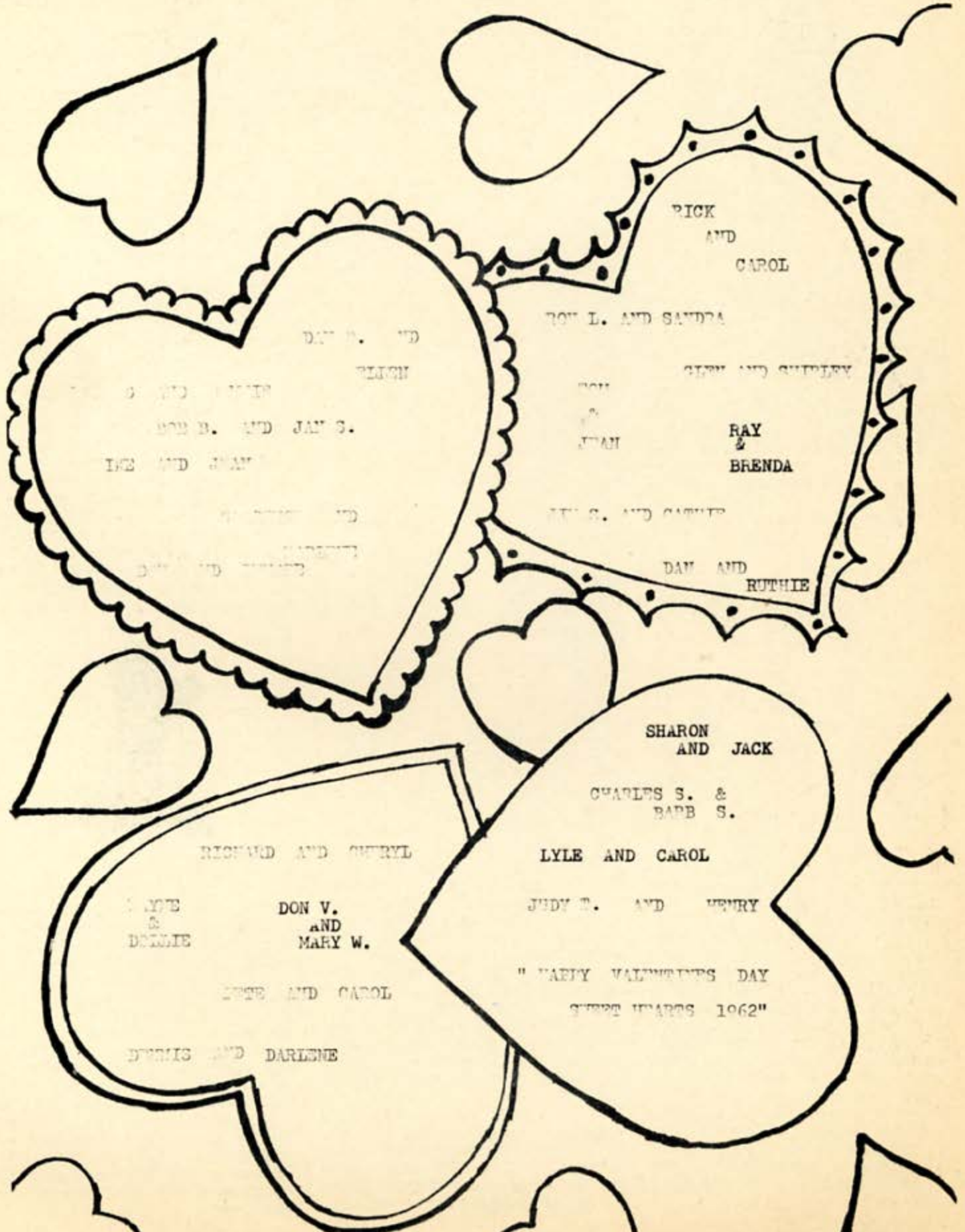

BOOK REVIEWS

"Watcher in the Shadows" by Geoffrey Household

This is the story of a man-hunt, of a protracted duel fought out in London and in the countryside of Sussex by two of the most accomplished and deadly intelligence officers to have survived the Second World War.

Their duel begins ten days after U-E Day and they bring to it every ounce of the cunning and courage on which their lives depend. They are fighting over a woman long dead. The tension in this book would be unbearable were it not for periods of poetic relief.

"Invincible Louisa" by Cornelia Meigs

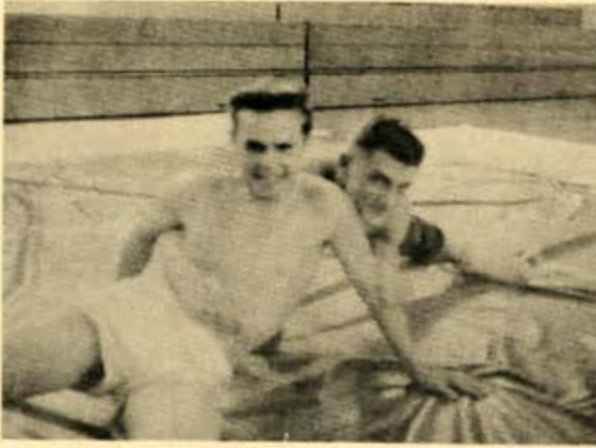
This is the story of Louisa Alcott, author of "Little Women", and her duantless battle for achievement. We see Louisa, who was taught by her father, engaged in the incongenial task of teaching small children, writing little flower stories for the benefit of Emerson's daughter, nursing Union soldiers in a Georgetown hospital until she became seriously ill, and visiting Europe as a companion to an invalid girl.

She wrote "Little Women" to help support the family and the success of the book, which brought her fame, has made her universally beloved.
