Mary Herb Named Valedictorian; Delores Earls Is Salutatorian

Highest scholastic honors at Bonduel High School this year go to Mary Herb, valedictorian, with a four-year average of 96.3, and Delores Earls, salutatorian, with a four-year average of 94.9.

Both girls have been active in extra-curricular activities at Bonduel. Mary was co-editor of the school newspaper in her senior year and associate editor in her junior year. She was the junior class president, and, as such, chairman of the 1949 homecoming and junior prom.

In the forensic field she won A's in the serious declamatory division of the league contest for the past two years. She was a member of the band for two years and the girls' glee club for three years. In dramatics she was a member of the play cast during her freshman and sophomore years, and participated in the school contest play and senior class play.

She had the leading role in the all-school play this year, and, as a junior, was vice-president of the skit club and a delegate to the Bonduel F. H. A. chapter to the state convention at Wisconsin Dells.

She was a member of the library club her senior year and was chosen queen of the Bonduel invitational track meet.

Mary plans to attend the University of Wisconsin where she will major in sociology.

Along with maintaining the second highest scholastic average

in the class, Delores served as a co-editor of the annual and was feature editor of the school newspaper and a member of the glee club.

Delores came to Bonduel in the beginning of her senior year from James Whitcomb Riley High School, South Bend, Indiana, where she won three certificates of merit and two honor award pins for having the highest average in her sponsor group.

She previously attended Iron River High School where she was active in glee club work.

A summer job is Delores' main interest at the moment, after which she will work toward her B. E. degree in Michigan.

Other outstanding seniors chosen on scholastic average are Gerald Druckrey, Bill Brunner, Ronald Glock, Helen Engel, Norma Kallies, Robert Dingeldein and Charles Moede.
