## Bonduel Bears Down Oconto Falls 25-8

A hard-hitting Bonduel High School team scored three touchdowns in the last quarter to beat a power-house from Oconto Falls 25-8.

The Falls broke into the scoring column first, with a safety, as fullback Rod Blom fumbled on a bad pass and was tackled in the end zone.

Bonduel kicked from the 20 yard line and after a series of downs forced Oconto Falls to punt. Bonduel received the ball on the 35 and after a hard run act and passes took the ball to the Oconto Falls 12 yard line. Herb on the next play smashed off right tackle to score. Blom booted and Bonduel led 7-2 at the half.

Oconto Falls came back in the third quarter to regain lead on Jerry Bramschreiber's beautiful fake reverse. The kick was blocked and the score stood 8-7 in the Fall's favor.

Bonduel received the kick on the 35 yard line and marched on ground play and a nice pass from Blom to Herb to the 2 yd. line where quarter-back Dale Druckrey plunged over for the touchdown. Herb scored the second touchdown of the quarter with a 20 yard sweep around the right end to make the score 19-8.

The game was clinched in the last minute of play when Bonduel's center Pat Fox intercepted an Oconto Falls pass on his own 35 and went all the way on a series of beautiful blocks set up by Bonduel's wide awake line.
